Bullying including cyberbullying	The school delivers anti-bullying assemblies as well as discussion through the PSHEE programme, which is termed FLOREAT in College and Thrive at The Prep. Both schools operates a buddy system for new students and the Sixth Form Prefects act as support in addition to teachers, student support services and also the Director of Pupil Welfare. Karl Hopwood is also invited in to deliver online safety seminars.

	Early help/prevention: FLOREAT/NSPCC curriculum including the buddy programme (JS) and Chelsea's choice in the SS. Access to Student Support/ DSL for guidance and advice. Vigilance of attendance/medical matters and staff are trained in spotting the signs. DSL/DDSL are familiar with routes of referral.

Domestic abuse/violence	 Domestic abuse (verbal). Advice will firstly be sought from the Community Social worker, 01452 426 263. If deemed to meet the threshold, a MARF will be completed with consent from parent(s) (where possible). Domestic Violence. A MARF will be completed, and consent sought where possible, but referral made in all incidences. Where concerns involve abuse within teen relationships a STREET referral will be made where it meets the threshold. Early help: Enlist support and advice from the early help hub with
	extended referral to GDASS. There is access to pastoral and emotional support in school through HsMs and also SSS/DPW.
Eating disorders	PSHEE curriculum focuses on a healthy balanced diet and on positive body image. Vigilance by HsMs, the Health Centre and the safeguarding team on the eating patterns of all students identified as a concern. Referrals will be made to Brownhills through our school Doctor.
Female Genital Mutilation	It is mandatory to refer any suspected cases of FGM – this can be done by calling the at risk helpline at GSCP (01452 426 565 and selecting option 3). Staff are made aware of the signs through single agency safeguarding training. Vigilance of attendance/medical appointments and patterns of holidays aboard. DSL seek advice from the FGM Unit: fgmenquiries@homeoffice.gsi.gov.uk
Mental health concern	Pupils are monitored through our pastoral support systems and at risk pupils placed on our welfare monitoring lists. All students have access to help and support through their HsM and can refer themselves to psychotherapists by emailing Students Support Services, sss@cheltenhamcollege.org.
	Mental health issues are covered extensively in our FLOREAT and Thrive programmes and students at College also have access to the MeeToo app. Pupils who are deemed to be at risk are monitored by the Director of Pupil Welfare (Head of Wellbeing at The Prep) and a Priority Pupil Plan is devised in conjunction with the pupil, parents and other professionals. A large majority of pastoral staff are trained in Mental Health First Aid.
Radicalisation	 Any immediate concerns about a pupil or group will be reported to the local police prevent team using 101 or via the Antiterrorist Hotline, 0800 789 321. Pupils exhibiting concerning behaviour but who do not present as an immediate threat will be referred to the Channel team through the MASH. Concerns can also be raised by emailing Specialbranch@gloucestershire.pnn.police.uk
	Prevention - Students are taught through the FLOREAT and Thrive curriculum about British values.
